Dr. X fate up to jury

HACKENSACK. (AP) — The fate of Dr. Mario Jascalevich, the surgeon accused of murdering three hospital patients with curare, is going to a jury 34 weeks after the start of his trial, which ignited a major free press controversy that reached the U.S. Supreme

Judge William Arnold, who iailed New York Times reporter Myron Farber for contempt of court in the case, was to give the jury its instructions today.

The 51-year-old Argentine-born doctor is charged with administering fatal doses of the muscle relaxant curare to three patients at Riverdell Hospital in Oradell more than 10 years

Jascalevich was indicted in 1976 on five counts of murder following a series of articles by Farber about the deaths. Arnold dismissed two counts during Jascalevich's trial.

If convicted of the remaining three counts, Jascalevich faces a maximum sentence of three consecutive life terms.

Farber resumed serving a contempt sentence Oct. 12, after the U.S. Supreme Court declined to stay his sentence for refusing to surrender notes Jascalevich's attorneys argued were crucial to the doctor's defense. The court has yet to rule on appeals by Farber and the Times, which has been fined \$100,-000, plus \$5,000 a day for every day Farber refuses to turn over his notes.

Jascalevich's lawyers have charged that Farber, former Bergen County Prosecutor Joseph Woodcock and Dr. Michael Baden, New York City's medical examiner, who investigated the case, conspired against the doctor for political and financial gain.

But the main argument before the jury is whether curare was in the bodies of patients Carl Rohrbeck, Frank Biggs and Nancy Savino — and if so, how it got there. When the presence of curare was verified by prosecution witnesses, the defense challenged the reliability of the scientific tests employed.

Manhasset. Police said Walsh was accused of charges of reckless endangerment and criminal mischief and released in his parents' custody for an appearance in family court.

Anastas Mikoyan dead at 82

MOSCOW (A?) - Anastas Mikoyan, the durable Bolshevik who survived 40 years of often bloody Kremlin intrigues and managed to retire with honor, is dead at 82.

The Soviet news agency Tass said the former president died Saturday after a long illness. The Communist Party and government made the announcement Sunday "with deep sorrow."

Mikoyan's death leaves only two of the old Bolshe-

to live out his life in oblivion, having been branded an accomplice to dictator Josef Stalin's crimes.

Kaganovich was ousted from the Politburo in 1957 and reportedly sent to run a cement factory in the Ural Mountains. He has not been heard of since.

Mikoyan, a dour-looking man with a black mustache whose nose was twisted from an old fist fight, had an uncanny ability to weather political storms often fatal to his comrades.

He escaped Stalin's purges in the 1930s and '40s. Even as it appeared his luck might run out, some said, he was saved by Stalin's death in 1953.

He denounced Stalin as murderer in 1957 and backed Nikita Khrushchev that year. But when it was time for the ax to fall again, Mikoyan was on the side of the Andrei Kosygin-Leonid Brezhnev thrust which in 1964 forced

Khrushchev from power. Mikoyan was born in Armenia, the son of a carpenter. He studied for the priesthood - as Stalin did and won top honors in school. He joined the Bolshevik Party when he was

The revolution of 1917 came two years later, and Mikoyan was a member of the Communist Party presidium in Baku. He was wounded during fighting there and was jailed when the Baku commune collapsed.

He was turned over to British forces and the White Guards and was to be executed along with 25 other top party leaders. They were shot, but he wasn't, apparently because his name was mistakenly left off the list.

Five months later he was released from custody and traveled to Moscow where he met with revolutionary leaders Lenin, Stalin and Trotsky, who launched him on his career.
